Baptism:

<u>Marriage</u>:

Couples planning to be married should contact the Rectory at least 6 months in advance of the intended wedding date. Attendance at a Marriage Preparation program is required in accord with Archdiocesan Policy.

Sacrament of the Sick and Holy Communion:

The parish priests are happy to assist anyone who wishes to receive the anointing of the sick, or to receive Holy Communion. Special Ministers of Holy Communion also assist in taking Holy Communion to those parishioners who are unable to get to Mass. For more information, kindly call the Rectory.

Catholic School Policy

School-aged children of OLC may attend either **Notre Dame de Lourdes Catholic School** in Swarthmore or **Holy Family Regional Catholic School** in Aston . Our Parish does subsidize Catholic education for parishioners of OLC who are active and contributing members of the Parish, in accord with Parish Policy. "Attending Mass is an act of humility..."

I woke up this morning with those words running through my mind. I don't know what I was dreaming, or even if I was dreaming. The thought was just there, scrolling like a marquee across my burgeoning consciousness as I rolled half-asleep from the bed and launched into my morning routine. It stayed in the forefront of my mind during the drive to work drowning out the drivel on NPR (National Public Radio). It followed me to lunch and stared unnervingly as I ate my warmed-over chili-mac. It is sitting on my shoulder right this moment assuring me that the only way to exorcise its presence is to explore the concept in writing in some depth. So here goes.

I'm pretty sure I know what stirred my unconscious on this one. Last Sunday leaving Mass, I asked my children, ages 12 and 18, why they never genuflect toward the tabernacle before they enter or when they leave the pew. Let me qualify the question by saying that I am something of a lecturing dad, and my motives in asking the question were not pure. I at least *think I know* full well why they don't genuflect, even though they have been copiously instructed on both the how and the why of the matter. My 12-year-old son is excruciatingly self-conscious and wants only to slink into and out of the last pew unnoticed. His concern is making any motion that might cause people to look at him. My daughter, at eight-een, is too prideful to kneel before anyone or anything, even God. That is not unusual for teenagers in our culture today, but it irks me. I'm quite certain her response to my question – a dramatic eye-roll and a change of subject – planted the seed that blossomed into this morning's wake-up call.

I'm not just ranting about my kids here. The thing is, lots of people in my parish either don't genuflect at all or do so in a kind of quick, bouncy half-curtsy that implies their conscious investment in the act is zero. Many show up for Mass dressed as if they happened by the church on their way to mow the lawn, or immodestly half-dressed, as if competing with God to be the center of attention. I've seen people text during the consecration of the Host, apply lotion before going up to receive the Holy Eucharist in the hand, and even turn around in the pew and hold a conversation with the person behind them while the priest is at the lectern fighting to save their souls with his homily. Okay, let's talk about *humility*, then.

One thing, perhaps the primary thing, that I think makes the Catholic Church so unpopular in America these days is its grounding in a time before our culture enshrined narcissism as a core value. Unlike myriad New Age gurus out there preaching some ego-stroking version of "*You Are God!*," or so many Protestant mega-churches (and their small town imitators) that twist worship into a crowd-pleasing, "people-centered" entertainment event, or even those fire and brimstone "Bible Churches" that urge obsession with one's individual sin and salvation ("*Are you saved, brother? Is Jesus your personal savior?*"), the Catholic Mass invites us to check our egos at the door. The Mass is an act of quiet, corporate worship that is profound precisely because it requires our default human self-involvement to be corralled in service to putting Christ at the center of our lives for at least one hour each week. There is a progressive, chiseling humility built into the whole equation.

The Church does not ask us if we *want* to be there. Mass is referred to as our *Sunday obligation*. It riles my daughter no end when I say she is *obliged* to attend Mass and that skipping out because she "doesn't feel like it" or to go to the lake with her boyfriend is a mortal sin. She does not believe this teaching of the Church (drawn straight from the 3rd Commandment) could possibly apply to her, simply because she doesn't like it. Because it would cramp her style. She'll go to Mass if *she wants* to go to Mass. Who died and made God her boss, anyway? For that chip to leave her shoulder, she will one day have to acquiesce to the notion that, when it comes to worshiping God, *what she wants* is utterly irrelevant. She'll have to set that aside and ask *what God wants*. Chisel, chisel. (*to be continued next week*)

Reflections by Father Leonard N. Peterson Eighteenth Sunday In Ordinary Time

Whenever those distressing pictures of famine victims come into my comfortable space, I suddenly become uncomfortable. Why exactly I don't know. After all, I didn't cause the problem. I didn't foster the civil strife or the climate factors that might have triggered it. Yet I feel this strong tug of guilt as if I did. I think it stems from my belief that no one who lives on this green earth of ours, especially the children, should have to face starvation.

On the other hand, I also experience a touch of healthy pride when I see quite different pictures of our military distributing planeloads of American grown food to such victims. Aid workers from our own and many other countries who also chip in to help underscores the truth we really are united with one another just by being human. As in other aspects of life, the good often balances out the bad.

The weekend's Scriptures offer the theme of food, and listening to what Jesus has to say about His coming to feed us made me think of a deeper human hunger that is spiritual. Sometimes I think our culture is in the midst of a "famine of faith." It's not necessarily a photographable famine, but it is a real one. While it can take many forms, it is most obvious in the cultural drive to push God and religion to the sidelines. One of the excuses used is what we now call "political correctness." I found myself ashamed of my hometown when I learned that SEPTA (the acronym that identifies the Philadelphia area transit system) will not be putting any signs up on its vehicles or its stations welcoming Pope Francis to town next month. This so as not to offend people. This also in a region with over a million Catholics. Sadly, our people probably won't protest the decision. As a result, our pope, who is anticipated as creating what has been officially touted as the largest event ever to occur in the City of Brotherly Love, there will not be enough of that love to honor him on some buses and trains.

For our part as believing Catholics, we will either have to accept such things like this becoming more and more "par for the course" or get up the courage to fight back in peaceful protest against them. That brings up the question of where we will get the energy to do so. Well, energy comes from food, and we have the greatest food source right in the nearest tabernacle or on the nearest altar at Mass. Since Jesus came, spiritual hunger should be a thing of the past, at least for those who believe Him. Do you get the picture?
