#### Confession:

#### Baptism:

#### <u>Marriage</u>:

Couples planning to be married should contact the Rectory at least 6 months in advance of the intended wedding date. Attendance at a Marriage Preparation program is required in accord with Archdiocesan Policy.

#### Sacrament of the Sick and Holy Communion:

The parish priests are happy to assist anyone who wishes to receive the anointing of the sick, or to receive Holy Communion. Special Ministers of Holy Communion also assist in taking Holy Communion to those parishioners who are unable to get to Mass. For more information, kindly call the Rectory.

#### Catholic School Policy

School-aged children of OLC may attend either **Notre Dame de Lourdes Catholic School** in Swarthmore or **Holy Family Regional Catholic School** in Aston . Our Parish does subsidize Catholic education for parishioners of OLC who are active and contributing members of the Parish, in accord with Parish Policy. #### "Attending Mass is an act of humility..."

The Church does not ask for our input into how we think the Mass "ought to" be celebrated, or even what we think might make the whole thing more entertaining or add to the experience for everybody. We aren't there to improve the Mass. We are there *to be improved by* participation in the Mass. Which implies acknowledging that there is room in each of us for improvement, that we are not already perfect "just the way we are..." Chisel, chisel... An article last summer in *Crisis Magazine* reported how the Anglican Church, to hold onto parishioners, has removed all mention of Satan and sin from its Baptismal rite, because:

"...the traditional rejection of the devil and all rebellion against God put off people who are offended to be addressed as sinners."

Wow. You won't catch the Catholic Church doing that. One of my favorite parts of the Mass is the *Confiteor*, where the congregation says in unison, *"I confess to Almighty God, and to you my brothers and sisters, that I have greatly sinned…"* The Church assumes that, from last Sunday to this Sunday, every parishioner will have, indeed, *greatly sinned*. And the Church makes that assumption because it's true. "For all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God," writes St. Paul. To teach otherwise, for any reason, is apostasy. Anglicans may pander to people's sensitivity for the sake of filling pews, exchanging the truths of Christianity for mere popularity, but not the Catholic Church. Every Catholic Mass begins with the priest asking each and every one of us to "… *call to mind our sins."* And we do. We all have them. Chisel, chisel.

Even as baptized, confirmed Catholics, to partake worthily of the Eucharist, the very *raison d'être* of the Mass, we have to first agree with the Church as to what constitutes *mortal sin*, and then we have to not have committed one since our last confession. And I hate to break it to my daughter, but skipping Mass is on the list, alongside many other common 21st Century "lifestyle choices" like extramarital sex, looking at pornography, using birth control *within marriage*, homosexual behavior, etc. Mortal sins are those acts which two thousand years of Church teaching affirm have the power to profoundly separate us from God – to, as Wikipedia phrases it, "*rupture… a person's link to God's saving grace.*" The Church tells us these acts have that power objectively, in and of themselves, whether we like it or not, whether we see anything wrong with them or not, whether we would like to enjoy them as culturally sanctioned personal "lifestyle choices" or not. We are not being asked for our opinion. No vote is being taken. Sin is sin. The Church knows best. Chisel, chisel.

I love this definition of *humility* from the Christian Bible Reference Site: Humility or humbleness is a quality of being courteously respectful of others. It is the opposite of aggressiveness, arrogance, boastfulness, and vanity. Rather than, "Me first," humility allows us to say, "No, you first, my friend." Humility is the quality that lets us go more than halfway to meet the needs and demands of others.

Jesus is really present – body, blood, soul and divinity – in our Catholic churches, both in the Eucharist confected during each Mass, and in any consecrated Host from previous Masses that is stored in the tabernacle. The core purpose of our attendance at Mass is that we might participate, physically, spiritually, intimately in that presence, to meet Christ in the Eucharist, to thank him for loving and saving us, to be fed and strengthened by his divinity in preparation for another week in the world. Another week of temptation. Another week of sin. Another week battling the concupiscence that dares us to forget about others, to think only of ourselves – to be *too prideful to kneel before anyone or anything, even God...* 

What Mother Church prescribes of us in our preparation for, and participation in, the Mass is to my mind proof that she knows what she's talking about. The Church knows what we need, even – and maybe especially – when we find ourselves too self-involved to even begin to understand that need on our own.

For one hour a week, the Mass calls us to humility. To show up, to dress appropriately, to genuflect, to stop trying to stand out and join with others in quiet, corporate worship. To call to mind our sins, and admit out loud that they exist – to almighty God, and to you, my brothers and sisters... To confess on bended knee, *Lord I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed*... and mean it. To be honest about our state of Grace or mortal sin, and to seek the confessional prior to Mass if we find ourselves lacking. Whether we want to or not. Whether we like it or not. Whether we find it all sufficiently entertaining or not.

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# Reflections by Father Leonard N. Peterson Nineteenth Sunday In Ordinary Time

Onomatopoeia. I know it sounds like something best handled by the Center for Disease Control. As a matter of fact, the word is all about sound. It is a figure of speech in which a descriptive word sounds like the item it describes. So we have brooks that "babble" and steaks that "sizzle." As a result of its use, the subject matter is better understood and appreciated. You can almost hear that steak on the grill.

Today the gospel uses such a word when it describes the crowd after listening to Jesus' startling announcement about Himself as bread when it records that "the Jews murmured." "Murmur" sounds like what it is: a complaint expressed in low vocal tones; a grumble.

Why did the people murmur? The gospel gives us two reasons. First, the people knew Our Lord's origins. His earthly parents were most likely their neighbors. They were likely friendly with some of Our Lord's cousins. Second, they presumed that no local boy they knew about should ever put on airs or otherwise dare to speak about Himself as Jesus did that day. "Bread from heaven?" So they murmured. Of course, Jesus heard them and ordered them to stop their noise.

He went on to tell them that God is here and now providing them with an entirely new kind of food, so much greater than the manna which He gave their ancestors in the desert. They had such food, but they still died. This new food, His own Body, would see them through this life and into the next.

Here we are, some twenty-one centuries later, on a summer weekend presuming on our divine Host to feed us this same miraculous food. We believe that the tiny host and the sip of wine are what Jesus said they are. We agree with St. Paul that the Holy Spirit has enlightened our minds and hearts enough for us to say "I believe." That we dare not forget, even if habit dulls our memories.

We have to remember invisible realities in this visual age, especially when we know about computerized trickery that fools our eyes watching movies or playing video games. There is an unseen world beyond our senses more real than we think. We need to remember because, combined with the familiarity that develops over the years, we can become blase about the Most Holy Eucharist, the Mass. When we see the tender awe in the eyes of the First Communion classes in our parishes, their sense of wonder at full power, it is a gift and a remedy for any adult indifference we might have on a Sunday morning.

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All the Church's ego-chiseling "requirements" regarding Mass are simply ways of helping us become capable of saying – and meaning – "*No, you first, Jesus.*" Of surrendering, for just one hour each week, our habitual aggressiveness, arrogance, boastfulness, and vanity. Of going more than halfway to meet the needs and demands of the one who laid down his life that you and I might live forever.

Is that really so much to ask? Really? *Attending Mass is an act of humility*. An act I thank God for each and every Sunday – in the pew, on my knees, at Mass where I belong. I pray my children will learn from my example what my words have failed to teach them.
