Reflections

Do you trust your auto mechanic? How about the car body repairman? In the latter case I do, because over the years he has done a fine job removing whatever dents and dings appear on my car, enough to satisfy my fussiness in the matter of its appearance. So at this point he is allowed to kid with me and ask "Do you still have a license?"

However, this whole matter of having a license to do whatever one does is serious business these days. We are all potential victims of charlatans and cheats out there plying their trade with no concern for the damage they do. The worst are the so-called computer hackers and identity thieves. I came very close to being one of their victims myself recently. The upset they cause is often severe. Luckily I escaped the trap set for me. But it let me realize that license requirements may not be such bad things after all.

When Joshua, Moses' chief aide, reports to his "boss" about two others named Eldad and Medad prophesying in the camp without any authorization (read "license"), Moses essentially tells him to relax. It's fine with him that God bestows gifts on many people in addition to the leaders.

The Old Testament story is echoed in the Gospel selection. Jesus rebukes John for his narrow-minded outlook on the good works done by other than inner circle people in Jesus' name. Here we find Jesus "the new Moses" doing what the old one had done. He adds that even a cup of water given in His name has merit. Remember that when you donate to the Church or other worthwhile entity.

No doubt, the many experts in human behavior can tell us what causes cliques to form. They seem to spring up wherever groups of humans are together, be it in families, businesses, schools, and yes, even Catholic parishes. Their exclusionary nature is hurtful. But when they cause scandal among "the little ones" Jesus refers to, they are worse.

Like-minded people will naturally come together. People skilled with the same talents or who enjoy the same hobby always tend to group together. Then they get to share ideas and take note of developments in their given activity. A moral problem surfaces when the members exclude newcomers. Sometimes jealousy rears its ugly head and generates envy within the group. A good leader will work to quash that kind of thing. In God's wise design, we need each other, just as Father Son and Spirit apparently do.

Consider the following. When a speck of dust blows into your eye, you instinctively rub it with your finger. You don't debate with the finger about whether or not to help the eye. Later, after pulling down the lid, causing the eye to water, the speck gets washed out. In a short time, the eye is back to normal. But without the hand, including its specially functioning fingers, the irritant would have remained. Just so is each member of the Body of Christ equally important. We need each other, folks!

This is especially true when life dishes out "dents" to our Christian resolve, or when our harsh enemy Satan "dings" that Body with disrespect and cultural disdain. You know where I'm headed: Time for a trusted Repairman, who just happens to be the very Person to whom we pray. Praised be Jesus Christ, now and forever!

Our Lady of Charity Annual Celebration of The Forty Hours Devotions

PARISH CATECHESIS ON THE FORTY HOURS DEVOTION

- 1. The Forty Hours Devotion is a special time set aside in every Parish, according to a schedule published by the Archdiocese, to honor Our Lord truly present in the Blessed Sacrament.
- 2. The Forty Hours opens at the last Mass Sunday (Our is the Second Sunday in October, at the 10:30 Mass), when, immediately at the end of Mass, Our Lord in the **Sacred Host** is exposed upon the Altar for the **adoration** of the faithful for a period of approximately **three days**.
- 3. The Church is open all day to receive the <u>visits</u> of the people and each evening there are special devotions, consisting of prayers, a special sermon and <u>Benediction</u> of the Blessed Sacrament.
- 4. The Host has been consecrated at Mass and has become really and truly Our Lord's Body. In Holy Communion, Our Lord is our <u>Food</u> for the Soul. In the Mass, He is the <u>Sacrifice</u> offered on the Cross and made present again for our salvation. In the Tabernacle and in the <u>Monstrance</u>, especially during the Forty Hours, the emphasis is on Our Lord as the object of our <u>adoration</u>. We adore God alone. Babies are not adorable, Our Lady or the Saints are not adorable, only God is to be adored. Since He is really and truly present in this Sacrament, we adore It. Hence we genuflect, we incense, we carry the Blessed Sacrament in the great procession.
- 5. The Monstrance is a golden vessel used to place Our Lord in for the adoration of the faithful. Its name comes from the Latin word "monstrare" which means, "to show."
- 6. Forty Hours or three days are significant because Our Lord was praying for forty hours in the desert, when He asked the Apostles: "Could you not watch one hour with me?" He says the same to us during the Forty Hours.
- 7. We "make a visit" to Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament as we would to a friend or loved ones. We keep Him company and we tell Him we love Him and we tell Him of our needs because He is really there and He loves us and listens to us.
- 8. Benediction is the blessing of <u>Our Lord Himself</u>. This is why the Priest covers his hands with a veil when he blesses the people with Our Lord, to show that this is not the blessing of the Priest, which is a great thing and which the Priest gives with his hands, but an even greater thing, the blessing of Our Lord Himself, now in our midst.
