Baptism:

First-time parents and godparents are expected to attend a pre-baptismal formation session, which is offered on the second Sunday of the month in the Church after the 10:30 a.m. Mass as needed,. To register for session, please call parish secretary before first Friday of each month.

<u>Marriage</u>:

Couples planning to be married should contact the Rectory at least 6 months in advance of the intended wedding date. Attendance at a Marriage Preparation program is required in accord with Archdiocesan Policy.

Sacrament of the Sick and Holy Communion:

The parish priests are happy to assist anyone who wishes to receive the anointing of the sick, or to receive Holy Communion. Special Ministers of Holy Communion also assist in taking Holy Communion to those parishioners who are unable to get to Mass. For more information, kindly call the Rectory.

Catholic School Policy

School-aged children of OLC may attend either **Notre Dame de Lourdes Catholic School** in Swarthmore or **Holy Family Regional Catholic School** in Aston . Our Parish does subsidize Catholic education for parishioners of OLC who are active and contributing members of the Parish, in accord with Parish Policy. Children who attend public school are requested to register in our **PREP** Program beginning in first grade to seventh grade. PREP meets on Tuesday evenings from September to May from 6:30 to 7:45p.m. There is a minimal tuition requested to defray costs of the materials. Reflections by Father Leonard N. Peterson Twenty Eighth Sunday In Ordinary Time

In some circles, Pope Francis is a square. By that I mean he personifies for some that proverbial square peg that never fits comfortably in the round hole. Why is that, I wondered, as this powerful gospel selection comes up for meditation this weekend?

Taking a step back from the mouthings of this good pope's media critics, it occurred to me that some of those folks are wealthy. They have raised alarms to their audiences that the current man in white is a socialist, if not a Marxist. How clumsy of the Holy Spirit to choose him! These self-proclaimed "experts" would likely never concede that the pope's mentor is no less than Jesus Christ, whose vicar on earth he is.

It is true that our current Holy Father has made a lot of otherwise comfortable Catholics a bit upset, especially when he speaks about poverty and wealth. They forget he speaks as a pastor, not as an economist. He who spent his days off as the cardinal archbishop working with priests serving in the poor ghettos of that storied city would inevitably question the systemic cause of the problems there. Despite his critics, this man has managed to get the so-called "First World" to be more aware than it has been for too long about the suffering in the "Third World."

It is striking how our present culture's take on wealth is much the same as it was in ancient Judaism. That man who "ran up to Jesus" on that long ago day was a product of his age. At that time, riches were seen as a sure sign of God's approval of one's lifestyle. The big difference today is that God is of no concern. But no wonder the original disciples were perplexed by Jesus' opinion of riches as an obstacle to true joy.

When Jesus turned the tables on that kind traditional thinking and said what He did, His eager questioner "went away sad", for he owned several large homes here and abroad, and managed a sizeable portfolio of investments. (Please pardon my freelance translation).

The Church makes no wholesale condemnation of wealthy people. How could she? She simply restates what Jesus says in today's pivotal Gospel about how wealth can fool susceptible people into thinking either that they are above others, or that they have no need of God.

The evidence is everywhere that secularism acts like a virus. Look at how successful the effort to sideline God has been. In a specifically hideous example, we learned this past summer that Planned Parenthood has huckstered the body parts of infants for profit! Astounding, but true.

The wisdom so prized by Solomon instead of his gold is seen by so many people as a foolish trade off. Having "many possessions" can do that to you. Conversion will only come about with better evangelization and bolder Christian witness. We know already that such will bring about persecution also, as Jesus warned. But isn't that a small price to pay? Better than being impaled on a certain two-edged sword for not living as God wills.

Meanwhile, we can find hope in the fact that in many circles, made up of both rich and poor, Christ is at the center.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Every year we remember in a special way our Baptismal call to mission as we celebrate **World Mission Sunday**, this year on **October 18**. On this Sunday, we will gather at the Eucharist, as will Catholics throughout the world, in a spirit of love for Evangelization. This year's celebration is further enriched as we mark the 50th Anniversary of the Second Vatican Council's Decree on the Missionary Activity of the Church [Ad Gentes] which proclaims, "The pilgrim Church on earth is missionary by its very nature," reminding us that **all of us are called to be on Mission**.

As we remember the World Meeting of Families and the Pope's recent visit, his **World Mission Sunday**, message may hold a special meaning for us in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. He says, "Mission is part of the 'grammar' of faith, something essential for those who listen to the voice of the Spirit who whispers 'Come' and 'Go forth.' Those who follow Christ cannot fail to be missionaries..."

On World Mission Sunday, as our archdiocesan family joins our brothers and sisters around the world, we connect with our world on mission: ...with Africa, where six million children receive an education in some 16,000 Church-run elementary schools...with Asia, where those who are sick are provided with care at 5,000 Catholic hospitals and small clinics...with the Americas, where catechists travel to remote areas to bring the Good News of the God's great love to families...with Oceania, where young men are supported in their studies for the priesthood...with Europe, where new churches are being built to welcome faith communities, renewed after years of persecution.

Your prayers and material support will help the Pontifical Mission Society for the Propagation of the Faith, the Holy Father's chief missionary arm, to provide resources to missionaries who proclaim the Gospel and offer help to our brothers and sisters throughout 1,150 mission dioceses. As I have said, "We should always put our money where our heart is...we should be very generous so that our missionaries will be supported not only by our prayer but also have concrete help."

I thank you in advance for your generous response to the needs of others. Pope Francis emphasizes that "Mission is a passion for Jesus and at the same time a passion for his people." May we have that same passion this **World Mission Sunday**, as we share the joy of the Gospel and help the poor by our fervent prayer and through generous hearts.
