<u>Baptism</u>:

First-time parents and godparents are expected to attend a pre-baptismal formation session, which is offered on the second Sunday of the month in the Church after the 10:30 a.m. Mass as needed,. To register for session, please call parish secretary before first Friday of each month.

Marriage:

Couples planning to be married should contact the Rectory at least 6 months in advance of the intended wedding date. Attendance at a Marriage Preparation program is required in accord with Archdiocesan Policy.

Sacrament of the Sick and Holy Communion:

The parish priests are happy to assist anyone who wishes to receive the anointing of the sick, or to receive Holy Communion. Special Ministers of Holy Communion also assist in taking Holy Communion to those parishioners who are unable to get to Mass. For more information, kindly call the Rectory.

Catholic School Policy

School-aged children of OLC may attend either **Notre Dame de Lourdes Catholic School** in Swarthmore or **Holy Family Regional Catholic School** in Aston . Our Parish does subsidize Catholic education for parishioners of OLC who are active and contributing members of the Parish, in accord with Parish Policy. Children who attend public school are requested to register in our **PREP** Program beginning in first grade to seventh grade. PREP meets on Tuesday evenings from September to May from 6:30 to 7:45p.m. There is a minimal tuition requested to defray costs of the materials. No one is denied access to PREP because of an inability to pay.

Pastoral and Finance Council Summaries of our last Meetings

Joan has included in this bulletin, the summaries of our latest Pastoral and Finance Council Meetings. Please see them on the next page.

Property Committee Summary

I have been providing periodic updates since June about the work of the Property Committee. Here's the latest update:

As you know, we have received permission over a year ago from the Archdiocese to possibly sell or lease our school and or convent buildings. The Property Committee has been discussing the best financial and neighborhood friendly goals of the sale. The Parish Councils have given their permission to this process with great support. At this point, we have submitted all the required permissions and appraisals to the Archdiocese. Their review process will not be completed until June. We don't expect any difficulties from this review. In the meantime, I have requested that our real estate brokers make some selected inquiries from local Catholic entities and other businesses/colleges concerning our properties to see if there is any interest. They are in the process of doing that work at this time. Otherwise, we are intending on listing the properties once we receive the permission to do so from the Archdiocese. Overall, we expect any sale would take about 18 months to complete, so it's good that we are beginning this process now. As always, I will keep you informed every step of the way.

SUMMARY OF RECENT PASTORAL AND FINANCE COUNCIL MEETINGS

PASTORAL COUNCIL FEBRUARY 8, 2016

Discussed envelope mailings that are sent out and we do not receive that many envelopes back, our return is about 20%. Joan will review records with Envelope Company. Father Izzo will contact inactive parishioners to inquire about their status with the Parish. He noted that many Pastors in the area have begun to write letters to such parishioners. Noted: Phone calls don't work, because so many people now have cell phones, and we don't have the updated numbers....lack of responses from census requests.

Reviewed upcoming Lenten opportunities in our parish.

Discussed the need for volunteers for Don Guanella House.

Discussed the School and Convent Sale or Lease. Since July the Property Committee, has been working diligently on this. To this point, the appraisals were completed mid-December and the Council has just begun to take up the discussion. Questions arose about the process with the Archdiocese and how to actually begin to list the properties.

Aside: In late January, the Parish Councils met jointly to discuss this issue more in-depth with our real estate broker, Mr. Jim Leary. He was available to answer many of the questions and to further speak of the results of the appraisals.

Evelyn Tarpey Brennan from Archdiocese Office of Pastoral Planning was present to work with Council members on developing a Pastoral Plan for the parish. Discussed challenges of our parish and others. In discussing the Pastoral Planning Process, which we have already done, it was noted that that process is still underway and that every parish in the Archdiocese will be involved in it in some fashion. Discussed how we can get people of the parish involved in activities.

FINANCE COUNCIL FEBRUARY 9, 2016

Discussed the School and Convent Sale or Lease and that there were appraisals done on both. Spoke in-depth about the details of the appraisals.

Family Promises will be leasing the convent for a year beginning on March 1, 2016.

Mr. Blair gave the 6 month review of the budget to actuals to the members. Sunday collections are down 6% from last year. We have received donations for the Sanctuary Renovations as well as items purchased from the Ecclesiastical exchange.

Reflections by Fr. Leonard Peterson Easter Sunday March 27, 2016

One of the great derivatives of this "Day of Days" is its endorsement of hope. So much struggle stalks our lives that hope loses out to its opposite for many people. Often enough our call to seek "what is above" is abandoned. At the worst, we cry out "Where is God?" in any serious intrusion on our plans. The rush of changes in technology doesn't help.

A respected spiritual writer offers this analysis: "All the givens have changed and all the rules with them. Built-in obsolescence is the new given. Things are made to be discarded or upgraded or replaced. Everything in life is simply another step, not the final step, in the process of becoming something else. Life itself has become a series of life-changing interruptions we are meant to expect and to broach with very little help."

I resonate with that observation. I feel the pressure in small matters, like updating my smart phone, all the way to important items like reminding Catholics about the Church's definition of marriage when the world all around us challenges it. Add to these things the whole problem of the "throwaway culture," as Pope Francis describes it.

So we need Easter. We need to remember how Christ's death and resurrection sheds light on our skewed cultural outlook and shows it for what it is. Nothing but darkness in disguise.

The empty tomb is more than the triumph of Jesus, although it is certainly that. It is also, for believers, the source of a joy that ameliorates sadness, and offers the message of life after this one. It is the certainty of objective truth towering over fashionable half-truths and outright lies. The Risen One knew the future as well as the present when He once said of Himself "I am the Way and the Truth and the Life."

Perceptive people know that maintaining this Easter faith today is almost as difficult as it was for the Church's early martyrs, albeit in a different way, as a type of "dry martyrdom." Even this is changing however, as we note the Christian victims of ISIS and its brutality.

A saintly John Paul II, who emerged from Nazi persecution and Communist intimidation, called out in his inaugural homily "Be not afraid!" Those are the same words that the Christmas angels told the shepherds on the hillside. They are the same words Gabriel said to Mary when He announced her coming pregnancy. Today we have the same words implied in the question the "two men in dazzling garments" asked: "Why seek the living among the dead?" Why indeed?

Standing in spirit before the empty tomb this Easter Day 2016, somewhere between anxiety and hope, we have to recall our cry of conviction, now centuries old but ever new: "Alleluia! He has risen! Alleluia!"
