Marriage

Couples planning to be married should contact the Rectory at least 6 months in advance of the intended wedding date. Attendance at a Marriage Preparation program is required in accord with Archdiocesan Policy.

Sacrament of the Sick and Holy Communion:

The parish priests are happy to assist anyone who wishes to receive the anointing of the sick, or to receive Holy Communion. Special Ministers of Holy Communion also assist in taking Holy Communion to those parishioners who are unable to get to Mass. For more information, kindly call the Rectory.

Catholic School Policy

School-aged children of OLC may attend either **Notre Dame de Lourdes Catholic School** in Swarthmore or **Holy Family Regional Catholic School** in Aston . Our Parish does subsidize Catholic education for parishioners of OLC who are active and contributing members of the Parish, in accord with Parish Policy. Children who attend public school are requested to register in our **PREP** Program beginning in first grade to seventh grade. PREP meets on Tuesday evenings from September to May from 6:30 to 7:45p.m. There is a minimal tuition requested to defray costs of the materials. Synod on the Family, Rome October 4-25: From Our Archbishop

From Rome, October 21: In less than a week I'll be home in Philadelphia and hopefully – finally – back to the normal life of a great diocese. I use that word "great" deliberately. What makes Philadelphia unique is not its legacy, or industries, or universities, or cultural centers. All these things are important, but they're just words until we remember the people who give them life. The Church in Philadelphia is "great" because of her people. She's blessed in her clergy, religious and lay faithful. Above all, she's blessed in her families, rich and poor, who sacrifice to support their parishes and do their best to live the Gospel week in and week out. And nothing captured the real character of Philadelphia more beautifully than the outpouring of enthusiasm and love from tens of thousands of families that greeted Pope Francis last month and made the World Meeting of Families such a memorable success. As the 2015 Synod on the Family draws to a close here in Rome, bishops from around the world continue to praise those remarkable days in our city. One of those bishops is the bishop of Rome. On October 20, via the apostolic nuncio, I received a letter dated October 5 from Pope Francis himself – addressed to me, but meant for every Catholic and every other person of good will across the Philadelphia region:

I wish to express my great appreciation to you and the clergy, consecrated men and women, and lay faithful of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia for your warm welcome. I am especially grateful for your brotherly hospitality, and for the zeal, piety and enthusiasm which you shared with me and which daily guide your episcopal ministry. I am sure that our days together will continue to deepen the bonds of communion which we enjoy.

I thank you also for your many efforts in preparing for my visit to the Archdiocese, especially for the World Meeting of Families. Your commitment to the family was evident in the organization of the Meeting, and I know how diligently you and your staff; along with so many volunteers and benefactors, have worked these past three years. I trust that these celebrations will bear a new harvest of grace for your local Church and will be a source of renewal for marriage and family life.

Assuring you of my fraternal prayers, I cordially impart my Apostolic Blessing to you and to all those entrusted to your pastoral care as a pledge of peace and joy in the Lord Jesus.

These past three weeks in Rome have been strange and hopeful at the same time. Strange, because the synod reported in the media and the synod actually taking place at the Vatican are rarely the same creatures. The issues of modern family life are complex. They have great importance for the future of the Church and the world. So the work of this synod matters. True to his style, Pope Francis has encouraged an open and frank spirit from the start. Differences among the synod fathers - including serious differences on serious matters - are part of the natural flow of discussion. Bishops at the synod need to deal with such matters candidly. Otherwise, nothing good can result. But "warring camps" simply don't exist. The mood among the synod fathers has been far friendlier than any commentators seem to imagine. There are no "revolutionaries" or "reactionaries" in the synod hall - only bishops sincerely trying to face sensitive issues and chart the right course for the Church in the light of the Gospel. Which brings me to why this synod experience has also been hopeful. It's one thing to hear about the "catholic" nature of the Catholic faith. It's another, deeply reassuring thing to see it alive in the intelligence and dedication of bishops from around the world gathered as brothers in one place....The point is: Whatever develops in the short term from this synod, God remains with his Church. We should cultivate that peace in our hearts. We need to trust in God's Word, and we need to pray for and trust the Holy Father. Otherwise we defeat our own discipleship. Confusion - as I was famously misquoted, out of context, a year ago - is of the devil. We shouldn't be part of it. It will be good to be back in Philadelphia. (Minor edits for space constraints)

Reflections by Father Leonard N. Peterson Solemnity of All Saints

"I Love a Parade." I'm pretty sure that Harold Arlen (nee Hyman Arluck, d. 1986) was not thinking of the parade of the saints when he wrote that catchy tune. Yet the picture of a parade conjured up by that old song lyric is what leapt to my mind when I contemplated today's Readings. That "vision of people which none could count, from every nation, race, people and tongue" would not be standing still, but marching joyfully. I imagine them in their white robes, toting those palm branches and smiling all the way. Different as they would be from each other, their costumes and their joy would be identical. As a unique group, they give meaning to the description of our Catholic Church as "Here comes everyone!"

Some examples of what I mean. Certainly St. Thomas Aquinas has little in common with St. Thomas More, save for their first names and their faith. Nor does fiesty St. Teresa of Avila, a Doctor of the Church who died in 1582 have much in common externally with the shy Therese of Lisieux, also a Doctor of the Church, who died at age 24 in 1897, except for their names, status, and feastdays last month just 12 days apart. But they, and all the canonized saints of our Church, "parade" before our eyes, so to speak, as models for life.

Naturally, we have to add among the marchers all those believers in the faith whose names are largely unknown, such as the family grandmother who is dubbed "a saint" by all who ever knew her.

I think we need this "parade" this November Sunday 2015 for no other reason than the fact that people are actually asking whether or not we are living in "the end times." Someone did just that over the weekend of a retreat for married couples that I recently led. The world really is a dangerous place these days. Terrorists seem to have won the battle when you think of all those expensive security procedures that were put in place before and during the pope's visit to our country. There was indeed a gentler time in our collective past.

Recall that story of a teenager who actually conjured up a plan to kill the pope? Or the fact that there exists internet instructions for making a bomb? Or that Planned Parenthood would actually seek to profit by selling the body parts of aborted children? Evil has many faces.

Dear friends, we need help to fight this battle. With the aid of the Holy Spirit, we can win it. In striving to imitate those saintly paraders I mentioned, and many more, it seems that therein lies the only authentic credentials to guarantee that we'll all be there "when the saints go marchin' in."

Christmas Mass Schedule

We are looking for your input about the time of Masses for Christmas

- 11. Christmas Eve Masses are popular. In the 1990's, OLC began scheduling three vigil Masses for Christmas, as I well as three Masses on Christmas. Then, there were three or more priests, so each priest got a Vigil and a Mass on I Christmas, in addition to our parish having over 2,500 families. Now we are just over 1,600 families, and technically speaking, one priest assigned to the Parish.
- 2. Last year, we reintroduced the Midnight Mass, which had a very nice attendance. There were some requests made over the years to again have the Midnight Mass. We are one of only a few places in our area that have the Midnight. Also popular is our earliest vigil Mass at 4:00 p.m. which is the earliest time allowed in our Archdiocese to schedule a Vigil Mass for a Holy Day. But surprisingly two years ago, we had over 575 at the 4:00 p.m. Vigil and last year, only 440 at the same time.
- 3. I would like your feedback, please, concerning the "Choir" Mass at 7:30/8:00p.m. Traditionally, this is the Mass where the choir performs carols about 30 minutes prior to Mass. For the past three years, we really haven't had a singing program before Mass, expect for maybe 10 minutes prior to Mass beginning. Plus, the attendance at this Mass has also dwindled the last few years. Last year, we might of had 100-115 people. (And I know there's no perfect time, and family traditions change, etc.)
- 14. When we used to have three vigils at 4:00, 6:00, and 8:00 p.m., the least attended of these was the 6:00 p.m. So I we dropped that time slot in 2011, and kept the 4:00, and 8:00 or 7:30 p.m., as it was last year due to the request of I the choir members, who also return to sing at the Christmas Day 10:30 a.m.
- 5. So, this year, OLC will definitely have a 4:00 p.m. and Midnight (celebrated at Midnight). Christmas Day will be our regular Sunday Schedule.
- 6. Consequently, I would like to know if you would also want an additional Christmas Eve Mass, and if so, what time? Also, would you want an additional time for Mass on Christmas Day, depending upon your family traditions and holiday plans.
